
Picture work

beach holiday

7 ideas for use at **Starters**:

- Say *These people are on holiday. They're having a beach holiday. Do you go to the beach? What can you do at the beach?* Write on the board: *I can at the beach.* Ask for suggestions to complete the sentence (eg, play games, swim, walk, sleep, have fun).
- Learners make *yes* and *no* cards. Ask *Can you see a T-shirt / boat / kite / train / house / child / computer / table ?* etc. Learners hold up their *yes* or *no* card.
- Learners add 3 more balloons to the picture: behind the car, in the boat, under the chair.
- Review / teach tent then ask Where..? questions about the book, oranges, ducks, trees.
- Give colouring instructions for the kite, the sea, the sun, the tree next to the café, the man's bags, the girl's hat and the board game. You might like to teach chess.
- Point at the oranges and watermelon. Review / teach *fruit*. Learners draw then name other fruit on the board. Starters: *apple, banana, pear, grapes, kiwi, mango, pineapple*.
- Write on the board *I'm here too. Look! I'm...* Learners copy and complete their invented sentence.

7 ideas for use at Movers:

- Ask Where is the rainbow / towel / comic / swimsuit / star / island? Where are the roller skates / cups / rocks / waves / rabbits / shorts / sailing boats? Learners listen and point.
- Review comparatives / superlatives and review / teach *tent* then give colouring instructions for *the roof of the taller house, the smaller rabbit, the longest balloon, the biggest tent, the youngest child's arms and the oldest person's legs!*
- Pairs choose to add words to the picture by writing on the sign boards. Learners use dictionaries if necessary. Ask *What did you write?* Accept any feasible answers.
- Ask: What is the old woman cooking? What are the rabbits thinking about? What's in the back of the car? Pairs write imagined answers. They read them out in open class.
- Ask Which is the most exciting / most boring / quietest / hottest / wettest / nearest holiday place? Learners offer suggestions. Their sentences could begin with 'I think...
- Ask Would you like to have a camping holiday in this place? Why / Why not?
- Learners imagine they are in this picture. Ask *What are you doing? Are you having fun?*What text message are they sending to a friend or parent? Learners write the message.

7 ideas for use at **Flyers**:

- Ask Where is the castle / fire / pair of striped trousers? Where are the steps to the beach / friends who are playing chess / things that are drying? Learners listen and point.
- Give colouring instructions for *the umbrella, bin by the path, cushion in the nearest tent, the seats in the duck's boat, the pocket on the rucksack* and say write *'hotel'* on the board by the car and *'steps'* on the board by the path.
- Ask pairs to create a food/drinks/price list for what you can buy from the camp site café.
- Learners take turns in groups to 'be' something or someone in the picture. Other group members ask yes/no questions to identify the answer.
- Review / teach *early, broken, delicious, furry, interesting, plastic* and *tidy.* In pairs, learners invent 7 sentences about the picture. Each sentence contains one of these adjectives.
- Learners imagine they are going on a camping holiday. Ask *What is in your rucksack?* Which is the most important? The heaviest? The oldest? The newest? The silliest?
- Review / teach the months of the year and how to talk about and write dates. Then, in small groups, learners write a short dated diary entry (or a short story) about their day at this camp site. (30 50 words).
